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In addition to the alterations made to these slides, much of our work is being both mischaracterized and taken out of context without the accompanying framing we do in our workshops. For example, one of the things we talk about when taking people through these and other slides on Developing a Common Language is that individual people (of any background) can hold stereotypes (fixed and distorted images) about other groups (of any background), individuals (of any background) can have prejudice and bias (assumptions, beliefs, and feelings about other people based on stereotypes) about other people (of any background), and individuals (of any background) can discriminate (mistreat people, show favoritism or preference towards some over others) against other people (of any background).

But, at Just Communities, we don't talk about individuals being racist (or sexist, heterosexist, etc.) or not. When we use the term racist, or sexist, etc., we're referring to systems of inequality (i.e. oppression). We can explore how people (of all backgrounds) are impacted by those systems and how people (of all backgrounds) participate (consciously or unconsciously, intentionally or unintentionally) in perpetuating those systems through action, inaction, or silence, but we don't label people as racist, sexist, etc. or as oppressors. We don't use language of oppressors and the oppressed, or oppressor and victim. In fact, we don't label people at all. We talk about how labeling people doesn't help and actually distracts us from the work of understanding how systems of inequality operate which makes it hard to then explore how to dismantle those systems and foster equity.

We explicitly state that labeling people undermines efforts to work together to promote equity. It shuts down dialogue, it drives people away, and it's not accurate.

We also explicitly state that our work is not about blaming or shaming people. It's not about good people and bad people. We state that none of us created these inequitable systems and institutions, that they were created long before any of us arrived on this Earth. But, we maintain that they do exist and that we all have a responsibility to address them so that all members of our community and society can thrive.

Finally, either the lawyer or Fair Communities Education left out some slides which are critical to understanding our entire framework. For example, the included (and altered) a slide on "Privilege Group Collusion" but didn't include the slide on "Target Group Collusion" making it appear that we state that only one group of people are responsible for maintaining these systems of inequality.

We are left with the questions of who changed these slides and with what intention?
